BOOK REVIEW

I, Fatty

By Jerry Stahl

(Published 2004)

This book is a novel, a fictionalised autobiography of Roscoe Arbuckle, known universally as 'Fatty' Arbuckle. The narrator is Fatty himself.

Although written as a novel it tells the true and tragic story of Fatty's life.

From childhood Fatty suffered

ridicule from his father which affected his sense of worth throughout his life. However, he became a hugely popular silent film actor, comedian, director and screen writer. He was a massive star of the emerging Hollywood film industry. In 1920 he was the first film actor to be paid \$1,000,000 a year (equivalent to \$15,000,000 today).

In 1921 he was falsely accused of the rape and manslaughter of Virginia Rappe who happened to attend a weekend hotel party that Fatty had arranged together with friends.

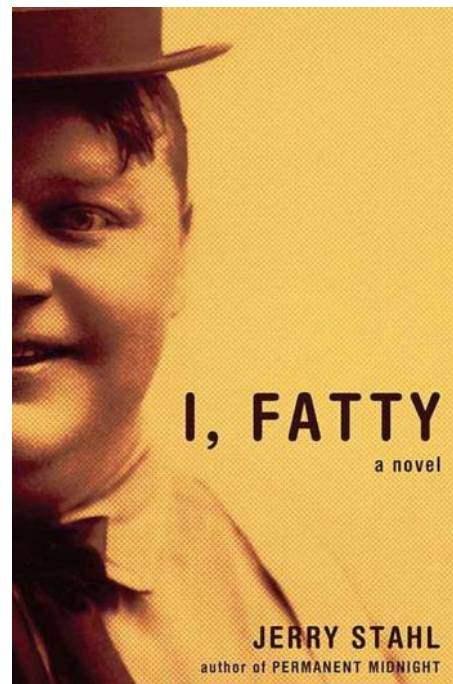
The ensuing publicity and his prosecution effectively destroyed his career and personal life. It was said to be the first big scandal in the American film industry.

Fatty stood trial on three separate occasions. The newspapers sensationalised the matter which led to a public outcry against the Hollywood film business and Fatty himself.

He tried to return to films but not entirely successfully. He later worked as a director under the pseudonym of William Goodrich. In 1932 he made a brief comeback signing a contract with Warner Brothers to star in a series of comedy films. Sadly, Fatty died suddenly in his sleep of a heart attack in 1933 aged 46.

This is a tragic tale, very cleverly written with one-liner gags and much humour throughout which Fatty would surely have approved of and appreciated.

From the *Leicester Evening Mail* ... Friday 10 November 1950

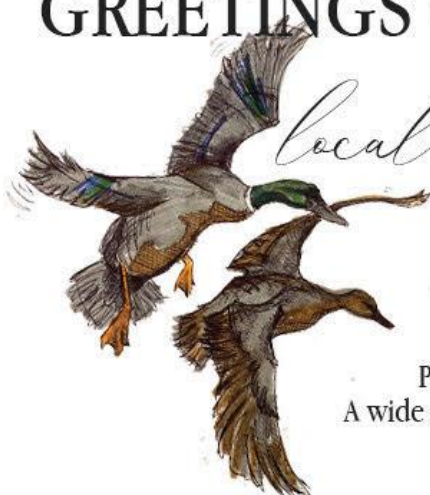
WATER BLAMED FOR WYMONDHAM ILLS A suggestion

agreed to do.

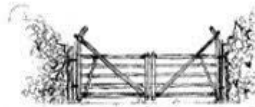

ULTRAFAST FIBRE BROADBAND

Questions were asked in the village hall on Thursday evening (2 November) and answered by staff from OpenReach about the possible installation of Ultrafast Fibre to the village.

openreach

The important points in brief were ...

- As more products need more and more bandwidth the need for fibre will increase in the coming years.
- Copper broadband will become obsolete in the next few years, every household will have to then transition to fibre. Signing up for the scheme means Wymondham is connected to fibre sooner rather than later.
- 450 properties are within the area of the scheme including Edmondthorpe, Teigh and many outlying farms.

- Most importantly the scheme and the chance to sign up for fibre broadband in the village will end on 30 November. If enough sign-up the village can expect to be on full fibre by the end of 2024.
- There will be no disruption to service during the transition from existing copper broadband to ultrafast fibre.
- The cost of a fibre package varies from provider to provider and also on the speed of service required.
- The commitment OpenReach are asking for is for households and businesses to sign up to a 12 month fibre agreement, with any ISP, once it is available.
- It doesn't matter if you own or rent your house, the agreement is with the person contracted for broadband - the occupier.

Applying for a free UK Gigabit voucher from the government's Gigabit Broadband Voucher Scheme and contributing it towards the cost of Ultrafast Full Fibre broadband being extended to the village is the first step towards achieving this goal. It's easy to do, keep reading

Currently the village is 64% of the way to achieving a 1Gbps broadband speed with 81 households and 5 businesses having indicated their support for the scheme.

RECOLLECTIONS of FOOTBALL in WYMONDHAM (PART 1)

Recollections of football in Wymondham contributed by Anthony "Kit" Kitson

Football in Wymondham – a few memories from the 1960s and on. I've been meaning to write some blurb about the Wymondham football team for many years and here, finally, I've stopped tweaking my FPL fantasy team (again) and hit the keyboard.

Most villages with a population of 300 or more used to have a football team – and often a cricket team too. Players very often lived in the village for which they played, and they would usually know each other outside of their football lives. Indeed, they often worked with each other in local factories, trades and businesses. In the 1960s Wymondham played in the Rutland league, and to give you an idea of the standard it was somewhere between the Bundesliga and Under 8's Subbuteo ... but mostly Subbuteo.

I cannot remember exactly who it was who asked if I'd like to turn out for the team but it was probably someone like Bonnie or Derek Naylor. At the time I started playing for Wymondham the pitch was on Station Road (now Butt Lane) immediately above Wymondham Manor. It now seems very strange to see that field lined with young trees – in those days you could clearly see all the play from the road itself, and many thousands did. OK, so I lied about the thousands. Incidentally, Station Road was also the place where I heard that JFK had been shot dead. The Maddock girls, Sheila and Pam, who were leaving Wymondham on that very day, were the deliverers of that shocking news.

The "changing room" was the old green Nissen hut shed at the bottom of the field at the back of the Manor. It was used to store farm machinery and was completely open on one side. If ever a shot went just over the cross bar it would hit the Nissen hut directly behind the goal and the ball would bounce up vertically in the air with a loud dong (my brother Russell reminded me about that). The pitch was on a considerable slope from end to end and the Maloney horses that usually lived there left huge divots in the ground by way of hoof prints. The ball would rarely run true and Brian Clough's mantra of "play it on the floor" was certainly not conceived in Wymondham.

My very first game was an end-of-season match in the evening against Ridlington, probably around April or May 1966. I was 15. I didn't really know what I was doing but my team-mates were

encouraging and supportive in kicking either the ball or the oppo, but preferably both. We kicked up the hill in the first half and were leading 1-0 at half time. The second half was tight but we retained our slender lead until a few minutes to go when the ball landed in front of me about 35 yards out. With no Ridlington players around and without any plan whatsoever, cunning or otherwise, I swung my right foot in the general downhill direction of the Nissen hut. The ball sailed into the stratosphere, over the Ridlington goalkeeper, down under the bar and into the net. I was both embarrassed and elated.

"Well done boy!" exclaimed Reg Crabtree, and he proceeded to slap me on the back and break most of my vertebrae. Or at least it felt like it.

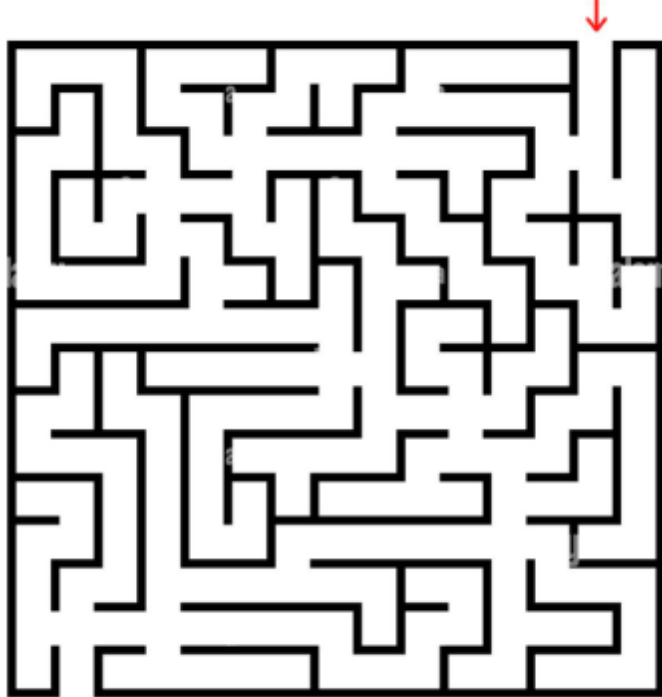
In the 1960s when I played we had some fantastic characters in the team, and my favourite was Derek Naylor. He was our regular goalie but would occasionally turn out as an effective winger. He had an excellent disciplinary record with respect to bookings – they were very rare - but Derek liked a little "banter" with the oppo and this usually took the form of advising them about their various inadequacies. Fisticuffs often ensued and Derek would bypass the booking and would be sent off by the referee. Talking of refs, I remember well one match at Casterton where Derek was sent off by the referee after just a few minutes. As he left the field he was very generous with advice for the ref, telling him to visit an optician while suggesting that he'd never be able to find one because of his terrible eyesight. Two more of our team followed later so we finished with eight players, losing 4-0.

WYMONDHAM HERITAGE TRAIL



In 2015, the Wymondham & Edmondthorpe Civic Society created the Wymondham Heritage Trail leaflet which offered a guided walk around the village taking in it's historical sites.

Occasionally we'll reproduce excerpts from the leaflet, which is no longer in print.

MANOR GARDENS—site of the old Manor

This modern development now occupies the site of the original Manor House. On entering the development note the stone architectural feature set into the wall on the left. This was found, along with a green glazed ridge tile, during archaeological excavations that preceded the development's construction and are thought to be part of the Old Manor House, the remains of which were uncovered (it having been recorded on the Estate Map dated 1652). Medieval structures in the form of post holes and ditches were also very much in evidence.



This had been the original home of The Lords of the Manor, Hamelin (1150-1290), Berkeley (1290-1635) and Sedley (1635-1700) and was abandoned in favour of the new more prestigious Manor House on the opposite side of the road. The Old Manor House buildings were then used for farming purposes.

A short distance into the development and down a short road to the left, bearing it's Blue Plaque (designed by local historian Trevor Hickman) is The Barn, 5 Old Manor Gardens. This is an example of what is one of the oldest surviving cheese maturing buildings in England, dating from before 1650 Stilton cheese was made in the dairy until restrictions imposed in 1940 stopped production.
