# FROM THE PEN OF THE PARISH PRIEST

How well do you really know the Christmas story? Like, do you know the stories that make up the nativity come from only two of the Gospels in the Bible?

Only Matthew and Luke have anything to say about Jesus' birth. And do you know that the little detail of Mary arriving in Bethlehem on a donkey isn't actually in the Bible? It comes from a book that never made it in, called the Infancy Gospel of James.

The Bible wasn't compiled instantly. In fact, the Gospels were written some thirty to forty years after Jesus died and came back to life. It took a good bit of time to decide which books would be included and which books not. So there



were enough of other texts floating around to help add little flourishes and dramatic touches to the story so many of us know and love. These texts contain some rather beautiful moments, like this one from the Infancy Gospel of James, where Joseph has popped out of the cave for a bit of a breather, leaving Mary to the hard work of giving birth to Jesus. As he looks around, he notices the whole of creation has stopped:

'I looked up into the air. With utter astonishment I saw even the birds of the sky were not moving. And I saw sheep being driven, but the sheep were standing still. And the shepherd lifted up his hand to strike them, but his hand remained above them.' At a time of flurry and bustle, we sometimes fail to stop and pause and let the wonder of Christmas fill

The Church has been complaining for years that Christmas has lost its true meaning. One saint, Gregory of Nazianzus, who died about 390 ad, complained even back then that people were making merry with feasting and dancing. But



perhaps the Church would have been better to encourage the celebrations, while also encouraging folk to find time and space to wonder at a love so great that God himself would be born as one of us.

So I wish you every blessing. I wish you all the joy in the world as you celebrate this Christmas. But I also wish you the blessing of wonder as you hear the story unfold once more. And I invite you to come and be part of the wonder that unfolds as we tell the story of God's love in our church buildings. j




#### **Answered Prayers**

By Duncan Hamilton (Published 2023)

"This book will be catnip to footie aficionados but also to those interested in the 1960s"  $^{\ast}$ 

This is a 5-star book, comprehensively researched, brilliantly written and absorbing.

**Answered Prayers** provides at last, a full account of English football's greatest achievement and the failures that followed it. We see the institutional inability to appreciate Sir Alf Ramsey and his players, who were taken for granted: the political machinations of the blazered fools who ran the Football Association; the shortsighted blunderers of the Football league.



At the centre of the book is Alf Ramsey and the eleven players who won the World Cup in 1966. It chronicles Alf Ramsey's playing career, including his 32 caps for England, his hugely successful managerial career at Ipswich Town and then as manager of the England national team.

The 1960s was a different world to today. Football players did not spit continuously, did not simulate fouls and they did not surround the referee and abuse him. They travelled to league games on the bus or by train, they walked to and from the grounds mingling with the fans and they had a pint after the game in the local pub with the fans. Today that sounds just incredible.

Alf Ramsey was totally dedicated to football, to his country and his players. He was completely focused and hard-working, a man of principle, possessing excellent football knowledge. Although he lacked charisma, he was an extremely good man manager and loved by his players. In this book he and the players come out of it extremely well. The FA do not.

The manner in which Alf Ramsey, in particular, and the players were treated after the World Cup Final is very difficult to comprehend.

There are some fascinating commentaries on individual players. For example, Nobby Styles was a practising Catholic. He was a totally different man off the pitch than on it. Away from the pitch he was a reserved, quietly spoken family man. On the day of the World Cup final, he walked to church and prayed that he and England would win. The author quotes words attributed to St Theresa of Avila:

More tears are shed over answered prayers than unanswered ones.

I suppose in modern speak it would be: Be careful what you wish for.

Read this book. You don't need to be a football fan to appreciate it. I loved it.








# **COLOUR by NUMBERS**

# MIDLAND AND GREAT NORTHERN JOINT RAILWAY

I am an Amateur Industrial Archaeologist specialising in Dismantled Railways. The difficulties in explaining what we do are that we all do something NORTHERN COLUMN RAILWAY.

different and that the people we are explaining to have been overcome by boredom within a few minutes.

The project I am working on is researching the M&GNJR between Saxby and Bourne. Once I have obtained all access rights I will be walking the track bed and taking photographic evidence of what remains of the line.

Apart from the quarry at South Witham the track is almost intact. This is because although it is very unlikely a railway company has a right to operate a railway on its original track at any time. So it could buy back the track in the future making building on the track very risky.



Wymondham has by far the most interesting buildings of the entire line. I hope to look in a series of articles at a different aspect each month starting now with the Goods Yard.

For such a small village and only one siding the goods yard is surprisingly large. The goods shed has ornate brickwork. Both these factors suggest that Wymondham was important to the railway company. The goods shed, weighbridge office and platform on which the cattle pens once stood still remain. Built in the 1890s and used by the railway into the 1960s these are the only buildings of their kind on the line to definitely survive. There appears to be a building at Bourne that could be a weighbridge office but this has not been verified. The goods shed would have housed non-perishable goods awaiting the next goods train to leave whilst the weighbridge office would have been used by the railway agent to weigh freight cattle sheep etc and sell space on the

next train to leave. Passenger traffic does not seem to have been huge and freight was the line's major earner.

The goods yard is earmarked on the Edmondthorpe and Wymondham Neighbourhood Plan for housing. I fully support this as I feel it only right that land such as this are put to good use . The unique nature of the goods shed and the weighbridge office however should I believe be

preserved within
the development
for future
generations. In
order that this can
be fully considered
I have applied to
Historic England
for the Goods Shed
and the



weighbridge office to registered as Listed Buildings. Listing would prevent them being demolished or altered and would preserve them for the future. As no planning application has been made for the housing development and the buildings are not therefore at risk at present Historic England cannot commit resources to look into their listing now. If however they become at risk in the future then steps will be taken to protect them.

If it all goes ahead, on schedule, the village will have access to 1Gbps full fibre broadband by the end of 2024. A major achievement for the village.

From there the path is well marked and you'll pass Mount Pleasant Farm, one of the Buckminster Estate farms, and Coston Covert, a small wood, before meeting the B676 road between Buckminster and Coston.


Take the track to the right which will take you past another

wooded area and then across the road between Sewstern and Wymondham.

Shortly after take the footpath to the right which will take you back over the Wymondham to Sewstern road towards the village.

As you approach Wymondham once again you'll follow the embankment which used to carry the M&GNJR line between Bourne and Saxby. An impressive structure that served the village until it's closure in 1959.

Once back in the village warm yourself in front of the pub's roaring fire whilst enjoying a drink and promising yourself you'll walk more often in 2024!



# **RECOLLECTIONS of FOOTBALL in WYMONDHAM (PART 2)**

Recollections of football in Wymondham contributed by Anthony "Kit" Kitson ...

Football in Wymondham – a few memories from the 1960s and on. I've been meaning to write some blurb about the Wymondham football team for many years and here, finally, I've stopped tweaking my FPL fantasy team (again) and hit the keyboard.

On another memorable occasion we played a "friendly" against our old enemy Casterton at home on a pre-season Sunday and Derek was having a match out of goal. Casterton had some good players, including identical twins. Their captain was a useful, tall, old fashioned bustling centre forward, and his wife was Casterton's biggest fan - a one woman, 120 decibel rent-acrowd. However, she was not the classiest woman in the world and bawled out her contempt when one of our forwards missed a sitter.

Classy Casterton wife: "Ha ha ha, what a miss. They're all <insert juicy Anglo Saxon expletive here> useless!"

Derek: "He wouldn't have missed if he'd been shooting at your mouth".

Absolutely everyone on the pitch was in stitches with laughter—including the woman's husband.

We'd have a Nesbit coach for the away matches and we'd have most of the players and few stalwart supporters – the most regular of whom was Bonnie Naylor, the nearest we had to an unofficial manager. Geordie Howden and Ben Naylor would often come along too as our rather taciturn rent-a-crowd. On one trip I was given a 1925 half-crown in my change for the fare ...... they're quite scarce and I still have it to this day. The oppo were usually RAF Stations like Luffenham or Cottesmore, other villages like Ridlington, Braunston, Pickwell or our perennial arch enemies, Casterton. We also played against Ashwell Prison and they usually had a strong team, occasionally including some excellent footballers from the Football League who were having a holiday at Her Majesty's pleasure.

Apart from Derek, the great characters in the team were Reg (I take no prisoners) Crabtree, Booey Naylor, Ron "Spud" Murphy and the Tyler brothers from Stapleford. Despite the modest

standard we had some excellent defenders like Graham Hickman who used to play at right back. He's still the local decorator of choice, but has now emigrated to Edmondthorpe. As well as bog standard journeymen like me, we had some very skilful players too, such as winger Tony "Lenny" Hunter and a little Irish wizard called George Stephenson – who I think was in the RAF when he played for us. Nevertheless, the best player of all to play for us was a home-grown Wymondham lad: Fred Bottom.

Fred usually played up front but could play anywhere. Not very tall yet very good in the air, fiercely competitive, fast, skilful – he had it all. He didn't play for Wymondham for very long because he was soon snapped up by bigger and better teams. While at school he was selected to play for North West Leicestershire. Wymondham FC ceased to be in the 1970s but many years later I had the pleasure of playing with him again when Harwoods had started playing just across the road from Manns Farm and literally a stone's throw from our house on Kirks Lane.







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# WYMONDHAM HERITAGE TRAIL



In 2015, the Wymondham & Edmondthorpe Civic Society created the Wymondham Heritage Trail leaflet which offered a guided walk around the village taking in it's historical sites.

Occasionally we'll reproduce excerpts from the leaflet, which is no longer in print.

#### THE HUNTERS ARMS

This Grade II listed building was formerly a pub, The Hunters Arms, which closed in June 1997. In the 18th Century it was the home of Mrs Frances Pawlett, who did much to establish the reputation of Stilton cheese. Her recipe produced a quality cheese of much higher standard than some others being produced in local dairies. She and her second husband William Pawlett, who also had a good head for business, marketed the cheese well. They supplied Cooper Thornhill, the landlord of the Bell Inn at Stilton on the Great North Road, with considerable quantities of Mrs Pawlett's own recipe cheese.



Mrs Pawlett died a wealthy woman on Christmas Eve 1808 at the age of 88. The inscription on her slate headstone (which can be seen in the churchyard not far from the church door) reads: 'Remember to Die', as she had outlived her son and most of her close relatives, who could have expected an inheritance.

#### **OLD CROWN COTTAGE**

Halfway along Nurses Lane, at No. 12 is Old Crown Cottage. This was brought by the Church Wardens and overseers as a poorhouse in 1778 for £21.

# **SCOTCH EGGS**



The Berkeley Arms
Chorizo and Black
Pudding Scotch Egg is
possibly the most
popular dish on our
menu. Certainly the
most popular starter.

We often joke that, when we take it off the menu, "locals burn cars in the street"! OK, it's

not exactly the Paris Riots but we definitely 'know it' if it's isn't on the menu for a short time.

The ingredients in a Berkeley Arm's Scotch Egg is a closely guarded secret and it's possible that they change occasionally as fresh ideas and ingredients come-to-hand. They're also seasonal and currently include venison.

Google 'the history of Scotch Eggs' and you'll be surprised by the many claims for their origin! Some claim they originated in Whitby in the early 19th Century and were originally coated in fish paste rather than sausage meat!

Fortnum and Mason also claim they made the first sausage meat coated Scotch Egg in 1738. Coating a boiled egg in sausage meat and then bread crumbs proved to be a popular food that could be taken as sustenance on long journeys.

Another theory asserts that the Scotch Egg evolved from northern India's *nargisi kofta* (an egg covered in minced meat and served with curry) which returning soldiers and others introduced to England.

There's are also a suggestion they aren't "Scotch" Eggs at all but were originally called Scorch Eggs, being cooked over an open flame.

An interesting variation on a Scotch Egg is a Manchester Egg, a pickled egg coated in sausage meat and black pudding.

Maybe the Berkeley Arms Scotch Egg is a cross between a Scotch Egg and a Manchester Egg?!

Whatever your thoughts on the origins of a Scotch Egg we suspect they will remain a popular dish on our menu for some considerable time to come!
