# WYMONDHAM & EDMONDTHORPE PARISH COUNCIL

#### Parish Council News - March/April 2024

At a well attended meeting to discuss traffic problems in the Parish on the 12th February, of the ideas floated to tackle the problems a chicane seemed to be the most favoured.

There are a couple of new tabs on the Parish Council website to hold information on flooding and traffic. And the traffic tab has a link to the Leicestershire Highways site dealing with all things and options "traffic calming."



It details the next five steps to be followed if the idea of a chicane is pursued. Also it cites a possible cost - £100000 and upwards! – but the financing of such may not be the dominant obstacle.

#### Should the Parish Council spend £150,000 of your money?

£150000 is the current approximate quoted price for such, according to Leicestershire Highways.

Where would the Parish Council (on your behalf!) get such a sum... and the answer is a loan from a magic device called

the PWLB – the Public Works Loan Board. This allows councils large and small to borrow on very low rates and over very long period of repayment.

But only if the ratepayers behind the Council that is applying support the request.

But actually you have already done this once when the Parish Council borrowed £8500 over 10 years in November 2019 towards the £20729 cost of converting our streetlights to LED (and since substantially saving on electricity charges!!). Making some assumptions, that exercise cost the average parishioner about 50 pence a month through an increase in their Council Tax that then goes to the Parish Council annual precept.

So is the idea a possibility?

# **FEBRUARY'S BOOK REVIEW**

Participants in "Books at The Berkeley" have kindly agreed to write a book review for The Berkeley Arms Newsletter each month. Please contact us if you could do the same.

Foster by Claire Keegan (Published 2010)

This short story is a mere 88 pages and is beautifully written. The writing is subtle and extremely skilful. Not a word is wasted.

The story is about a little girl who is left by her father at her aunt and uncle's farm house in rural Ireland for the summer holidays. She is left there because her mother is pregnant, yet again, and is close to giving birth. The age of the girl is not given but one could guess at about 8 or 9 years. The story is narrated by the girl herself.

It is apparent from the opening that she is nervous about being delivered to her relative's home with which she is not

familiar. When dropping her off her father is indifferent to her. He does not show her any affection or love when leaving her.

In contrast, her aunt and uncle, Edna and John Kinsella, welcome her warmly. During her stay the girl comes to experience a gentleness, care and kindness that she appears to be unfamiliar with. The Kinsellas spend time with her, encourage her to learn



new things and show her warmth and affection. During the summer the girl also discovers things she does not fully understand.

All things must come to an end and both the girl and the Kinsellas know that she must return to her home at some point and as the summer moves to an end the thoughts and fears of leaving are heightened.

There is a degree of ambiguity in the story that leaves the reader to consider and draw their own conclusions. Different readers will undoubtedly decipher certain parts in different ways. It is not what is said but often what is not said that is important and Claire Keegan is a master at achieving this.

This book is highly recommended. All of Claire Keegan's books have been critically acclaimed and deservedly so. They are available for loan from Oakham Library.

Claire Keegan is an Irish writer and the author of a number of short stories. She has won several prizes for her literature. Foster was chosen by The Times as one of the top fifty works of fiction to be published in the twenty-first century.

#### **MIDLAND & GREAT NORTHERN JOINT RAILWAY**

A second look at the former M&GNJR which passed through Wymondham courtesy of Andrew Bubb.

Just across the track bed from the goods shed sits Navvy Hut No 2 the surviving one of three original cottages.



A clever modern extension

providing accommodation for the occupier gives a visual impression of what the cottages would have looked like in the 1890s when they were built. Whilst impressive the cottage is a shadow of how it originally looked. The only navvy's cottage in England surviving on its original site, Navvy Hut No 2 quite rightly holds a Grade 2 Listing from Historic England. Station House was originally Navvy Hut No 3 and had 5 bays. It later

became The Stationmaster's House. Navvy Hut 1 and 2 had the standard 3 bays.

The cottages would have provided accommodation



for a navvy and his family and would often accommodate lodging navvies Cottages such as this were first erected in the 1840s. The design remained unchanged throughout. Built in sections (flat-packed) to be dismantled and re-erected on different sites along the line as work progressed, the cottages were erected wherever construction work was taking place. There is evidence to suggest that Navvy Hut No 2 had been in use on another site at an earlier stage.

This cottage survives on its original site as it continued to

provide accommodation for railway workers when construction had finished and the railway started operations.

The navvy's work was hard and extremely dangerous. Many men were killed, and others seriously injured. The present owner of the cottage wants to celebrate their work by opening the cottage as a living museum. Time and weather have taken their toll on the cottage and fairly extensive work is now necessary to bring the cottage back to its original 1890s condition. We are researching the original specification for a Midland Railway or Great Northern Railway navvies cottage to establish what still needs to be done and at what

cost. Applications to funding providers will then be necessary before specialist railway conservation builders can get to work and the dream of a Navvies



Museum can be realised.

Please note that, currently, Navvies Cottage No 2 is a private residence and the owner's privacy should be respected. A public footpath from Butt Lane to Wymondham Windmill passes near and a good view of the cottage can be obtained from this path.

Warning is given that the trackbed of the railway is private property and unauthorised access is prohibited. Just like live railway lines dismantled railways can be hazardous and the hazards are not always apparent.

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# WYMONDHAM HERITAGE TRAIL



In 2015, the Wymondham & Edmondthorpe Civic Society created the Wymondham Heritage Trail leaflet which offered a guided walk around the village taking in it's historical sites.

Occasionally we'll reproduce excerpts from the leaflet, which is no longer in print.

#### THE OLD GRAMMAR SCHOOL / READING ROOM

The stone building to the left of the Lych-Gate on Church Lane was originally "The Old Grammar School". Built c1670 on the instigation of the Trustees of the Sir John Sedley Charity, as a school for the education of the children of Wymondham. Sir John, who died in 1638, left £400 to be used for educational purposes for the villagers of Wymondham.



In 1881 the grammar school moved to the new building on the Melton Road. This original old grammar school was then brought and restored by the Rector and Church Wardens and opened as a parish reading room. The necessary purchase money was apparently raised by public subscription.

A slate slab on the front of the building is now gone and is in the church against the wall behind the knight and reads: "Founded by Sir John Sedley Bart AD 1637". Sadly the Reading Room lost all its books in the 1950's and then became a snooker club. It was eventually sold and is now a private residence.

John Sedley born about 1597 in Aylesford, Kent, was son of William Sedley and his wife, Elizabeth Darrell. He was educated at Magdalen College, Oxford whence he matriculated on 3 April 1609 aged 13. He graduated BA in 1612 and MA in 1613. That year he married Elizabeth Savile, daughter of Henry Savile and his wife, Margaret Dacre.
