THE FIGHT AT CRIBBS MEADOW



Cribb's Meadow is a small but intricate mosaic of diverse habitats, made up of grasslands, two ponds and a disused railway line, where scrub and mature trees are taking back the land, about 3 miles from Wymondham on the road to South Witham. A walk here is quiet and peaceful, but on Saturday 28 September 1811 it was far from either.

On that day a boxing match between English champion Thomas Cribb and African-American challenger Tom Molineux took place at Thistleton Gap, Rutland, on what is now known as Cribb's Meadow.

Molineaux had crossed the Atlantic to pursue a boxing career and may formerly have been enslaved - disputed but it's popularly believed that he was born into slavery on a Virginia plantation. The two men had fought first on December 3, 1810 at Shenington Hollow, Oxfordshire, with Molineaux defeated after 35 rounds in a much disputed decision. Their return match, fought for a purse of 600 guineas at Thistleton

Gap, attracted at least 15,000 spectators including many members of the nobility.

The walls at the Berkeley are adorned with pictures and curiosities connected with the area. Those that peak the most interest from visitors to the pub are, without a doubt, the three prints relating to the Cribb-Molineux fight.



The picture reproduced to the left shows Cribb with his second John Gully and his bottle-holder Joe Ward and Molineaux whose second was Bill Richmond (also Black and formerly enslaved), and Bill Gibbons his bottle-holder. The man holding the stopwatch may be the referee John Jackson. It is believed that the print of the fight was probably painted by George Cruikshank living in London (b.1792 d.1878).

Molineaux hit with great power until Cribb broke his jaw in the 9th round, then knocked him out in the 11th about 20 minutes into the fight.

After more fights across England and Scotland, Molineux crossed to Ireland and

fought until 1815. With problems from alcohol and time spent in a debtors prison, he died aged 34 on 4 August 1818 in Galway, Ireland.

Cribb lived to 66 years of age, retiring from boxing, setting himself up as a coal merchant (and part-time boxing trainer) and as a pub landlord (Union Arms, Panton Street, London) before his death in 1868 in Woolwich, London.

Thank you Kim, and Jonno, for such a wonderful gesture!













CALLCONNECT



Callconnect is a FREE (until 31 March 2026), on-demand bus service operated by Rutland County Council which includes Wymondham and Edmondthorpe.

The service operates Monday to Friday from 7am to 7pm and on Saturday between 8am and 6pm. You can book your journey from up to 7 days in advance to as little as just 1 hours notice (subject to availability). The vehicles are wheelchair

accessible and can readily accommodate a pushchair or walker.

The Rutland Callconnect area is bounded by Stamford and Clipsham to the east, Oakham, Uppingham and Caldecott to the south and Melton Mowbray to the west. Rides can be booked via the Callconnect App or via the 'phone.

WYMONDHAM HERITAGE TRAIL



In 2015, the Wymondham & Edmondthorpe Civic Society created the Wymondham Heritage Trail leaflet which offered a guided walk around the village taking in it's historical sites.

Occasionally we'll reproduce excerpts from the leaflet, which is no longer in print.

THE PRIORY

This grade II listed building can be best seen if you walk up Chapel Lane. It is not as old as it looks, however, as it is actually Victorian. It was built c1840, when some cottages along Back Walk, near the entrance to the church, were



demolished. It is believed some of the stone decorative features used on the front of the house came from the old manor when it was pulled down. The plaque on the front is dated 1637, which coincides with the date of the old Manor House.
